

50 years are worth celebrating!

It is a great honour for me to welcome you to the annual CAAS Conference 2016. This conference is definitely a special one because we not only celebrate more than fifty years of CAAS and its predecessor, we are also celebrating the Golden Jubilee of the *Canadian Journal of African Studies* (CJAS), our journal which, for half a century, has progressively become a model for academic publication in African Studies, and whose members' ideas have contributed to making Canada a key player in the world's intellectual engagement with Africa. For several years now, thanks to our partnership with Taylor & Francis (Routledge), CJAS has been published worldwide in electronic format and hard copy. C'est pour moi un insigne honneur de vous accueillir à la conférence annuelle 2016 de l'ACÉA. 




